Verbs Drill 1 | Answer Key

- 1. For the verb "is" the noun is *Empire State Building* and the tense is *present*
- 2. For the verb "reduced" the noun is *agreement* and the tense is *past*.
- 3. For the verb "had been (required)" the noun is professor and the tense is past perfect (passive).

"Had been required" is passive, meaning that the noun (professor) is not actually doing anything, but rather having things done to it/them. Passive verbs consist of the verb "to be" ("had been" is the past tense of "to be") and the verb's past participle ("required"). The "to be" portion of the verb can be treated just like a regular "to be" verb and follows all the same tense rules.

- 4. For the verb "have been (constructed)" the noun is <u>buildings</u> and the tense is <u>present perfect (passive</u>).
- 5. For the verb "lack" the noun is *buildings* and the tense is *present*.
- 6. For the verb "saw" the noun is *Julia* and the tense is *past*.
- 7. For the verb "had arranged" the noun is *flock* and the tense is *past perfect*.

"Was flying" is technically in the "past continuous" tense, but this tense is not generally tested on the GMAT. It is similar to the present continuous, except that it occurred in the past.

- 8. For the verb "is (wondering)" the noun is <u>he (Steve)</u> and the tense is <u>present continuous</u>.
- 9. For the verb "had" the noun is <u>he (Steve)</u> and the tense is <u>past</u>.
- 10. For the verb "orders" the noun is <u>he (Steve)</u> and the tense is <u>present</u>.

Verbs Drill 2 | Answer Key

1. Incorrect

Correction: In 1984, with the introduction of the Mario Brothers game, Nintendo *jumped* onto the world stage with a resounding "boink" and *has dominated* the video game market ever since.

"Jumped" should not be in the present perfect because it started and ended in the past (1984). Therefore, it should be in the past tense.

The domination began in the past, but continues into the present. Thus, the present perfect is appropriate.

2. Incorrect

Correction: A dramatic breakthrough by NASA researchers is expected within the next few months and we are all hoping that it *will inspire* humanity to explore the cosmos.

The "breakthrough" (it) is supposed to inspire humanity, but the breakthrough is not expected for another "few months." Therefore, the inspiration must happen in the future.

3. Incorrect

Correction: A pride of lions that *is* outside its native habitat finds familiar game hard to come by.

"A pride" is a collective noun, therefore the verb must be singular.

4. Incorrect

Correction: Several fast-food chains *had provided* the school with delicious burgers and fries until the school board *decided* to start buying healthier food.

The "providing" happened before something else the past (the decision), and should therefore be in the past perfect.

The "deciding" occurred in the past, after another event in the past (i.e., the provision) and should therefore be in the past tense.

5. Correct

The subject of this sentence is "each" (of the boys), which is a singular pronoun. Consequently, all the verbs that take "each" as their subject must also be singular. Given this fact, "was" is correct in both cases as it refers to "each."

The verbs should also all be in the past tense, since they all occur in the same time frame and do not depend on a specific order of occurrence in the past.

6. Incorrect

Correction: After stumbling and running clumsily down the hill, the men said that they *had been pretending* to be clumsier than they actually were.

The sentence contains two distinct actions that take place in the past: 1) what the men said, and 2) how they ran down the hill. Since stumbling and running (or pretending to) occurred before the men said that they were pretending, the earlier action must come in the past perfect.

The second "were" in the sentence does not need to be in the past perfect because it describes a general state of the men in the past, not a specific action that necessarily ended before the next event (when they said something).

7. Incorrect

Correction: The development of mechanized transportation systems early in the U.S. industrial period *was* regarded as pivotal in America achieving its place in the international economic tableau.

"The development" is a singular noun, and should thus be paired with a singular verb.

8. Correct

"The government" is the subject of the verb "is." Since both are singular, they agree in number.

9. Incorrect

Correction: The family of Saudi Arabian immigrants that *raised* me from the time I was six until I was of age to go to college was the best family I could ever imagine and my Saudi parents were always completely honest that I was not theirs by blood but they loved me nonetheless.

The sentence does not need the past perfect since there is only one time frame being discussed.

10. Correct

"The possibility" is the subject of the verb "has." Since both are singular, the subject and verb agree.
